- references to relevant literature (using Harvard method).





The process

Using some of the analysing steps taken from Braun and Clarke's research methods this is how I captured the data.

Step 1:

I Familiarised my self with content, transcribed video and read through the data collecting notes

Step 2:

I Coded the data highlighting sections

Step 3:

I applied themes to the data, I looked for key phrases or sentences that kept re curing through the group. To get to my analysis I transcribed the audio recordings, reading through the text and taking initial notes, and generally looking through the data to extract information.
